

British Locksmith Seeks Computer Programs

I have received your magazine for several years now and have found the American approach quite different and refreshing from the kind of locksmithing approach that we experience in England.

I have read your editorials, articles and your advertisements in the hope that some computer programs may be available in America that are suitable for my computer, but alas I have yet to see any talked about or advertised which are suitable.

The computer that I have is a one megabyte 'Amstrad' 8512, which has twin disc drives and uses CF2 compact floppy discs. 'Z80 CP/M' and 'Mallard BASIC' with Jetsam is the language medium. Unfortunately all the programs that are available in England for the locksmithing industry are only suitable for 'IBM' compatible computers, and

therefore not compatible with mine.

The programs that I am eager to obtain are: masterkeying and pinning, key blank or key logging, and a key codes program.

I would be most obliged if you could direct me to any person or company which produces, or sells such programs in America which are suitable for my computer, which I feel sure was sold in America but possibly under a different label.

Following is Robert Sieveking's reponse to William Castner's letter in last month's issue. Mr. Castner criticized his earlier article on masterkeying together different lock brands.

Purist, Come Home All Is Forgiven

For one to make the statement that something "can't be done," is to issue a challenge to all to find a way to accomplish whatever is requested. As a craftsman, I must necessarily be both a purist and a realist. The purist would dictate that when keying and master-keying cylinders, only original keys and original pins be used, and that all keys be cut to original factory depths. The realist makes the necessary decision to use .003" increment pins,

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aftermarket key blanks and substitute adaptor cylinders which allow Arrow locks to be used in a Schlage, Corbin or Sargent system.

Is the realist less a craftsman for his decision? If we lived in an ideal world, the customer would simply call and request the work without questioning the price. As locksmiths, we would only sell the finest locks, and there would be no need to adapt two locks to fit a common key.

A number of manufacturers have made "universal keyways" which allow the locksmith to key substitute locks into existing systems. The Weiser keyway is such a universal keyway. Harlock also made a similar universal keyway. The universal keyway concept allows the locksmith to install a Weiser deadbolt on a customer's door and key it to match a Kwikset or National Lock key-in-knob lock. The intent of the article was to allow the locksmith a method of interchangeably keying any of the three manufacturer's locks together, using methods that would reflect the highest professional standards. I have used and taught the concepts outlined in this article. By studying the methods I have presented, you

may find that you will be better prepared to service your customer's requests without losing their business to another shop that is more realistic in their approach.

Quote from the article, page 50, The National Locksmith, February 1989. "Ideally, all the locks in a particular building to be master keyed should be of one manufacturer. Sadly we do not live in an ideal world. We must make the best of what we have to work with."

Additional Entry Specs For G.S.A. Containers

I would like to add some information to Dave McOmie's "Art Metal Safe" article in your October issue. The General Services Administration issued a new specification (AA-F-358-G), March 7, 1989. This spec covers Class 5 and 6 filing cabinet-type containers, and has significantly changed entry testing procedures and equipment. Since the entry test criteria for this type of container has always been the same as for the map and plan type of safe

that was featured in Dave's article, it seems logical that the map and plan spec will follow suit. It's just hard to say when.

The new specification addresses some of Dave's misgivings about the logic behind the Class 5 label he was confronted with. Class 5 and 6 file-type containers must pass two distinct entry tests. In addition, the Class 5 must pass a 10 man-minute forced entry test which allows the use of non-powered tools only. A forced entry leaves obvious evidence of the attack.

A surreptitious entry test involves any type of entry which would not leave evidence detectable during normal use of the container or under inspection by a "qualified person." This test includes manipulation, auto-dialers, x-ray imaging, etc. There is a 20 manhour time limit on the surreptitious entry test, and any tool, or combination of tools, may be used. The only limitation is a weight limit of 150 pounds.

Covert entry is any method of entering the cabinet which does leave evidence. However, any signs of entry are not detectable by a user during normal operation of the unit. They




would be detectable during inspection by a "qualified person." This would be a forced entry where evidence of forcing could be hidden. There is a 30 manminute time limit on the covert entry test, with some restrictions on the tools that may be used.

There is a lot more to the test specifications than I have outlined, but this is a letter, not a book. Opening, repairing and servicing of G.S.A. approved security containers is fraught with specifications, restrictions and liabilities. Before working on any of these con-

tainers which are under military or Federal supervision (including Federal contractors), you are well advised to research the subject thoroughly. It's easy to do something that is top-notch work in the commercial world, but will get you into a heap of trouble with Uncle Sam. I hope this sheds some light on entry specifications for G.S.A approved containers.



Hopefully there is something here for everyone. The Technitips you see here are the last of those that will be eligible for the 1989 Technitips contest. I have a short Technitip to include in this month's column that concerns all the problems encountered in making keys for the '841/2 and up Ford 10 wafer ignition. If the lock offends thee, blow it off. After many hours of careful deliberation, I have decided that the manufacturer of this lock intended it to be "non-repairable" and "expenable."

By carrying a small selection of "uncombinated" All-Lock ignitions and a combinating kit you will be able to service the ignition in the field by making a door key by reading, then combinating a "new" ignition to a combination that will allow the key to operate the ignition and doors.

Removing the ignition is a two minute job, as illustrated in photograph one. A nifty "no mess" drill guide is

available from a number of manufacturers. This method is fast, easy and professional. The cost of a new lock is considerably less than the cost of making a key by any method that I've tried. Drilling a 4/4" hole to remove a \$5 lock is a time conscious and cost effective solution to the lost key. You might also include, that it is better security for your customer. The lost key will not operate the ignition to start the car.

December's Best Tip

Here's a method of opening a jammed mortise lock, when a key won't operate the lock from the outside. The problem is usually caused by the spring in the turn knob disc. When the spring breaks, the actuator looses its centering function and can be left to partially actuate the mortise lock. When the key is tried from the outside, the cam of the lock cylinder fails to operate the lock because the cam on the turn knob disc blocks movement of the lock bolt as you can see in illustration two-B. With the turn knob disc cam in the position shown, no amount of torque from the outside cylinder will retract the deadbolt.



bang on the door or drill through

the outside cylinder to get to the turn disc. The simplest method of solving this lockout is to take a piece of bent wire, and reach through the keyway of the outside cylinder to manipulate the cam of the turn knob disc. Once the cam is turned slightly, the key can be used from the outside to retract the bolt and open the door.

Purchase a carrying case for a piano keyboard at your neighborhood Radio Shack. This cost is nominal and the fit is perfect. The soft zipper case, shown in photograph three, will hold

all your tools and will not scratch or slide off the customer's car if you lay it on the hood or top. You'll save trips back to the truck and look more professional on the job. As an added point of professionalism, pack a clean towel to wipe any marks or smudges off the window.



Technitips that deal with organizing your tools or making your work environment neat or easier to work in are important to the locksmith. My tip is for a good way to organize and carry your car opening tools in the van. I have so much in my van, that I've run out of space to store my car opening tools. Most are too long to find a good home in a tool box or bin, and all need to be handy for quick use. If left to float around the floor of the truck, they become a safety hazard and a constant mess.

To solve this problem, I took a piece of plywood and mounted it behind the seat in my truck. To the board I mounted three 24" kitchen magnets. You know, the kind you see that are designed to hold kitchen tools and gadgets. Now all I have to do is slap my Slim Jim on the board when I'm through with it and it will stay there



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shim much easier to start into the shear line, and it also adds to the strength of the shim. The spring steel shims will not kink or nick on the ends like the commercial shims.

You will find that the .002" shims will shim 95 percent of the plugs you work on. The .0015" shims will shim


I made an interesting discovery. The U-Haul company has made a special effort to make the codes immediately available to service personnel. You will

until I need it again. There is no mess and no lost tools. (See illustration 4.)


The idea was improved by mounting the plywood away from the back of the seat about an inch and mounting three more magnets vertically, on the back side of the board. This doubled the storage capacity and made room for my wire tools. Across the bottom of the plywood, I mounted a board with holes drilled in it to accomodate a few screwdrivers and screwdriver type opening tools.

This Technitip involves making your own lock shims. I've found that the shims that I make in the shop will outlast the factory made shims by almost 20 to I. The shims are cut from spring stainless shim stock. This material is available in all machine tool supply houses, and the price is nominal. Cut the shim material into 2" by 1/4" pieces, using sharp scissors. Taper the ends and round the corners as you see in illustration five.



To achieve the nice curved shape, lay a shim on a smooth hard rubber bench pad. Lay an 1/8" rod over the shim and



find the codes for the vehicle on a metal tag riveted to the passenger side windshield post. It is an eight-digit number, and is recorded from bow to tip. The code is from the Toyota W-0001-2000 code series. These trucks use the X174 or TR-40 keyblank.

I might add that the code number is mounted upside down which makes it very easy to read from the outside of the windshield.

I hope you find this tip worthy of mention in your fine magazine.

This Technitip is for an emergency pin tray, or a pin tray that can be used and set aside, with the pins. You can make up a number of these trays to hold pins temporarily, while you clean or service the rest of the cylinder.

An ordinary piece of corrugated cardboard, with the top layer of paper peeled away makes a fine pin tray. If you cut the paper away carefully with a sharp knife, leaving a strip of paper along the top of the tray, you can label the grooves to correspond to the pin chambers, like the pin tray shown in




illustration six. Springs and small parts will not roll around or become lost if you place them in the tray with the pins. A piece not much larger than a match book will hold all the pins and springs for most locks. Simple ideas are usually the best ideas, because they just make sense.

This Technitip is for a method of opening an '85 Toyota Pick-up truck. I discovered this method out of need. I was driving home one night and came upon a man that was locked out of his pick-up. Asking if I could give him a little assistance, he said sure, and I began sizing up the situation.

Under the pull handle on the pas-


senger side of the vehicle, I noticed that the square hole for the handle piece was large enough to look into. Adjusting my mag-light and peering into the darkness of the door, I thought I could see the vertical lock linkage to the locking button. I fished a pencil out of my pocket, and probed in the darkness of the door while observing the action of the lock button. Sure enough, the lock button gave a little bobble that confirmed my suspicions. The linkage I was looking at was the lock rod.

Using the friction of the eraser end of the pencil against the lock rod, at an upward angle, I pushed the lock button up. Slick as a whistle, the truck was opened without a scratch.

This tip may seem fairly basic, but it sure worked for me. It's so easy, you don't even need tools.




This Technitip is for a reasonably sound method of making a folding Slim Jim. How do you store a Slim Jim when it's not in use? They are generally too long for most conventional tool boxes, and they are a hazard if left to



skid around the floor of the van. My Technitip is for a method of making a snappy lock joint in your Jim that will allow you to collapse it to half its length and store it easily, almost anywhere.

Cut the Slim Jim in half, and modify the ends as shown in illustration seven. Cut in from both sides with metal shears, as shown, and bend up a small catch or ear on both sides of the tool. Fit the top and bottom of the tool together as shown and drill a hole for the hinge to rivet. Rivet the two halves together and the job is complete. Hinge the tool out, and the catch ears will spring up to keep the tool locked in the






open position.

To fold the Slim Jim for storage, press down one of the locking ears and hinge the halves together. If you have followed the direction carefully your folding jim should open and close like a lock blade knife.

This Technitip concerns the lock on the pick-up truck camper shells or toppers. A large number of these shells are keyed alike. This is probably a convenience to the manufacturer, but not necessarily a good statement for security. I have also found a number of the "T" handle locks that contain only four of the five tumblers. If asked to recombinate one of these locks, always add the fifth disc.

The topper shells are delivered with the inside handle in the up position when the "T" handle is locked. This allows the tops to be stacked without breaking the inside handle. Part of the installation of the top is to change the position of the inside handle as you see in illustration eight. When the "T"



handle is turned to lock the rear door, the correct position of the handle is behind the tailgate. This increases the security of the lift door by preventing the door from being pulled out in the center to spring the side bolts out of place and open the door.

Loosen the set screw on the inside handle, and slide it off the square shaft to reposition it. There is usually plenty of shaft length for any thickness of tailgate. Your customers will thank you for increasing the security of their camper shells.

The terms "Access Control" and "Electronic Security," while virtually unknown to our industry in the not too distant past, have in recent years become common technology for many of today's progressive locksmiths.

Access control is nothing new. It has been with us forever. Locks, keys, guards, sentries, tylers, passwords, or a simple "Keep Out—Trespassers Will Be Shot" sign are all access control, and therefore the term should not be intimidating to any of us since we use it every day.


Electronic security, also state-of-the art terminology, has been around since the first electric doorbell was installed because access then became controlled electronically. All of us entered the world of electronic security the day we discarded the cigar box and purchased an electric cash register for controlling access to our money. So really, what else is new?

Keyless mechanical access control devices have been on the market for a number of years and many of us have elected to pursue this type of locking mechanism due to our fear of electricity and/or our lack of knowledge of electricity and electronics. While mechanical devices certainly have a place in today's market they are often difficult to reprogram (change combos) and many times create problems for the end user who attempts to do it himself.

Yale Security, through their Electronic Division known as Yaletronics, has provided something new by giving us the best of two worlds. They have combined mechanical with electronics in a simple package which should not scare even the most wary of us. Those of us who have not joined the wave of the future by staying away from electronics due to a fear of electricity, hard wiring, control panels, flashing lights, bells, horns and whistles can now provide our customers with keyless electronic access control by using the Yaletronic Touchcode System.

Totally self-contained, each Touchcode lock is a battery powered, no wiring required, stand alone unit that is designed to operate individually or as part of a total system of control. I prefer things simple and the Touchcode is simple enough for even me to understand. It is an easy way to enter the field of electronic security without the fear of getting my fingers burned!

The Touchcode utilizes a standard 5400 series lockset. (See photograph 1.) Yale has removed the locking plunger and placed a 36 OHM solenoid inside the spindle for the inner knob. Photograph two shows the plunger in the locked position. In photograph three the proper unlock code has been entered and the plunger has been retracted to allow the outside knob to turn. Now that's pretty simple, and its a really neat and compact package. Field service-



1. Standard 5400 series lockset.
























2. Plunger shown in the locked position.

able if the solenoid should ever fail, the unit doesn't come up with any surprises during disassembly.


Our first attempt at removal and replacement of the solenoid and reassembly of the lockset took about 20 minutes. This, of course, is bench time only. Mechanically, that's about all there is to the Touchcode lockset.

Electronically, there is nothing that even the inexperienced technician can't handle with ease. The Touchcode is controlled by an electronically eraseable and programable EEprom on a 3" × 3" control board, backed up by eight transistors, a bunch of resistors, (we counted 35), seven diodes, two capacitors, three CMOS chips, a Piezo buzzer and a female connector for an external power unit. If you can attach the battery connections, you have it hooked up.

Photograph four shows the control board layout. The EEprom is the large piece in the center of the board, replaceable if ever necessary. The Piezo buzzer is down and to the right of the EEprom and directly below the buzzer is the connector for the EPU (external power unit). The arrow points to the access hole in the cover plate for the EPU connection. The rest of the stuff

on the board is beyond my ability to explain and maybe your ability to understand and we don't really need to go into it.

The touch pad (see photograph 5) is on the front side of the control board and is a familiar layout for all of us. The battery pack which holds eight AA batteries, is in the top of the inner case and is accessible by removing two phillips head screws. (See photograph 6.) The Touchcode is shipped with phillips head screws in the battery pack cover, but anti-tamper screws and a wrench are provided. These are tough little rascals to get started but you can use a magnetic driver without worrying about magnetic effects on the control board.

Installation is a rather straightforward procedure and should present no problems. For replacement of an existing Key-in-Knoblockset, two additional holes are required in the door at locations "B" and "C" and a groove must be cut, filed or routed in the edge of hole "A." (See illustration 7.) For a new installation the template provides all the information to prep the door. In either case, tape the template to the door in the proper position, mark and drill or bore as required. The latch is

installed first and our usual procedure of leaving the mounting screws loose to allow some latitude in engaging the latch with the retractor worked well with the Touchcode.


With the lockset and the exterior escutcheon (containing the touch pad and the control board) loosely assembled, route the battery wires through hole "B," align the through bolt of the interior mounting bracket with hole "C" and then install the lockset through hole "A" in the usual manner. (See illustration 8.) This is where the need for the groove in the edge of hole "A" becomes apparent as it allows room for the solenoid wires to pass back through the door to the control board.

Note: We have discussed this step of the installation with Yaletronics engineering and future production may eliminate the need for the groove by routing the solenoid wires through hole "B" instead of hole "A."


With careful attention to insure that wires are not being pinched, position the interior mounting plate and attach with the screw provided. (See illustration 9.) Pull this screw down snugly but do not tighten at this point. Remove

the battery back coverplate and remow, the battery pack from the interior escutcheon. Next, place the interior escutcheon in position with the top edge fitting behind the tab on the mounting plate and install the spindle collar. Now, tighten the mounting plate screw, accessible through the battery pack opening (see photograph 10), and tighten the latch screws.

Attach the battery pack wires as shown in illustration 11, and place the battery pack into its cavity in the interior escutcheon. Making sure that all wires are clear of the housing and will not be pinched, install the interior knob on the spindle and you are ready to test the unit for proper operation. (See photograph 12.)


Before we test this rascal however, lets find out just what it is that we are testing for. The Yaletronics Touchcode system is designed to provide access to three different users or user groups with the ability to "lock-out" any one, two or all three users or user groups at any time by the use of a "lock-out" code.

Standard terminology that we are accustomed to with a key operated system is somewhat different with the Touchcode system. A change key becomes an "unlock code," a control key becomes a "lockout code," and a master key becomes an "executive or emergency code." Two additional codes are available: the master lockout code, which immediately locks out all three unlock codes, and a "pass code" which allows for reprogramming of all of the codes in use.

In effect, the Touchcode unit provides the ability to "change combinations" at any time with a few key strokes on the touch pad. As an example, let's assume a supervisor for the computer room is assigned unlock code #1 and the staff is assigned unlock code #2. The supervisor is terminated and a new supervisor assigned. Lockout code #1 is entered on the touchpad and unlock code #3 is activated. The previous supervisor is now locked out and the new supervisor has access to the room. Codes can be any combination of six digits from 000000 to 999999 which makes for thousands of useable combinations


Now, with the installation complete and an idea of what this thing is supposed to do, let's run our test. A factory programming sheet is provided with each unit listing all the codes entered at the time of assembly. Enter unlock code #1, (an audible tone is heard with

each key stroke) when all six digits are entered turn the outside knob and the latch should retract. Next enter lock-out code #1. When all six digits have been entered, three "beeps" will be heard indicating that the lockout code has been accepted.

Now enter unlock code #1 again. A two second tone will be heard, and the knob should not turn. Re-enter lockout code #1 and then unlock code #1 and the knob should turn and retract

the latch. Check each code on the factory programming sheet in this same manner, and the key override (Model 2160), and the unit is ready to become operational.

The "beep" tones can be turned on or off and the unlock time can be set from four to 16 seconds with a few strokes on the keypad. Although a fresh battery pack should operate for approximately 6000 operations, or about one year, a "low battery" alarm will sound after any valid unlock code is entered if the power is diminishing. An external power unit (EPU) is available from Yaletronics which can be plugged into a unit with dead batteries for access if the unit does not have a mechanical key override.

Available with (Model 2160) or without (Model 2150) a key override, five different knob designs and three finishes, the cylindrical Touchcode from Yaletronics should provide you with that first step into the world of electronic access control. Additionally, the Touchcode system has been adapted to the Yale 8700 series mortise lockset which is an easy retrofit to a mortise installation and one which we will cover in a future article.

It is that time of year again and all the new 1990 models are emerging. There is probably something that we can learn from each of them. I know that when we start to work on the Nissan 300 ZX (see photograph 1) we found that we were confronted with something we weren't prepared for.

To start with I think it would be fair to say that the engineers are aware of what we have been doing on this model opening on a lockout, so now they have blocked our access to the backside of the inside handle. (See photograph 2). They also placed a bolt through the glass itself about halfway up the win-

dow and attached it to the channel to keep us from bringing the glass out from the car, even though it doesn't follow a track. In photograph three you can see the track, so don't be fooled into thinking that this window is just laying against the rubber and you can

bring it out and insert whatever you want.

Upon approaching the car, we immediately fell into that trap of deception. We thought opening was going to be a snap since it appeared that the glass was just laying against the rubber. We went to our vehicle and got a wedge and an across-the-car opening tool. This tool is only about ¼" in diameter but there was no way that the 300 ZX window came out enough for the tool to enter. Maybe you could force it if you really tried but I feel that the chances are great that the window would break.

On the rear edge of the glass about center height was a fastener going right through the glass connecting it to the car frame. That didn't stop us considering the number of methods we know, so we then inserted a wedge between the bottom of the glass and the door and attempted to manipulate the inside lock button from its back side. We couldn't even make it wiggle. An attempt at trying to catch a horizontal rod proved fruitless also. We even tried a plain old Slim Jim and that didn't work either.

Later when we were involved in the key making examination of the car we saw why these methods failed. Every point we had tried to attack was shielded. We discovered that even though the window would not come out comfortably enough for the 1/4" tool to enter, we could bring it out enough to comfortably insert a small wire, but there was nothing we could do with the wire that would help us. Upon further examination we discovered that Nissan had incorporated a trunk release handle into this model on the floor between the driver's edge of the front seat and the driver's door. Fortunately, it doesn't have that additional key lock on the release that I've found on the Hondas. Once inside you have access to the trunk area, so we decided if we could get something on this release and pull straight up the trunk would release giving us access to the inside of the car.

We spent some time trying to figure out what would or would not work. We found if we went to the front edge of the window, the furthest point from the fastener, we could comfortably spread it enough to slide a key ring through. Now think for a minute; a give-away key ring wouldn't have enough weight to drop straight down and be able to control it, but a regular split ring, large enough to loop the handle would. The ideal line would be fishing line, but us city locksmiths don't have that in the service van-maybe some of you rural locksmiths do. Since we didn't have it, we had to settle for a piece of string. We tied the string to the ring and fed it through the opening (see photograph 4) letting it come straight down in front of the handle and then looped the end of the handle (see photograph 5) and pulled straight up, releasing the trunk.



Now I'm sure there must be an easier method but we could not come up with anything except picking. I get wrapped up in writing about by-pass methods and sometimes forget to mention picking as a valid approach. I think picking might just be the easiest method on this car. It's a wafer lock containing eight wafers, but then if picking fails here's a by-pass method that will work. If you find an easier by-pass method for this car, write it down and send it to me at the magazine. I'll try it and if it's easier

or better than this I'll see that it gets in the magazine.

As I mentioned, the lock has eight wafers and it uses an X123 Ilco blank (see photograph 6). Making the key is

our next project, and again this car presented some unusual problems, but before we start tearing the car apart, let's approach it with a little logic and common sense. I know I probably sound like a broken record but don't overlook the obvious! The obvious in automotive locksmithing are things like checking to be sure that the car is locked up, a window may be partially down, a wind wing may be unlocked, or keys hanging out of an exterior lock. When making a key check for things such as, key codes being written in the service manual or the sales contract, or codes stamped on the face of a lock, or a sticker with code on it placed in an easily accessible place.

Nissan, Datsun, and Subaru are famous for leaving codes on stickers. More often than not if you just open the glove compartment, you'll find a sticker on the inside of the door. The sticker will provide the key code but will omit the letter that precedes it. In the earlier years you had to use a process of deduction to determine this letter but on these new models, refer to your X and Y series codes. In most books these are combined; in a few they are separated. In fact, on any year of Nissan, Datsun, or Subaru that uses the double-sided key if you can count eight wafers in a lock the code series will be X and Y.

The other alternative to making the key by code would be impressioning or disassembling. I've always been reluctant about advising locksmiths in general to impression. These are wafer locks and are subject to bending if too much force is applied. If you have highly developed this skill, go ahead, but if this isn't one of your fortes, back















off and disassemble it instead. I think the only advice that I'll give on impressioning is if you decide to do it, use a rolling method of impressioning, not a rap method. (A rap method is where you apply a turning pressure and then rap the key with something such as a small hammer or mallet.)

The ignition lock (see photograph 7)

is the same type that you've been finding on Nissan products and is probably a good choice to work from if you are planning on impressioning but defintely a poor choice if you are going to disassemble. The glove lock at best would only provide a few of the wafers still leaving you with the problem of determining the remaining wafers. The door is usually our choice. We have learned that if we go for the passenger door and there is a code present, that's where we'll find it. Well let me tell you, this is not a door panel that you want to pull if you can avoid it. The biggest nightmare is where the seat belt connects to the door frame. It requires some special tools and special knowledge in order to avoid any damage or scarring. We decided to put the door approach on hold—not necessarily abandon it, but see if we could find an easier approach.

We checked the trunk lock area. This might not be a consideration on vehicles with enclosed trunks, but on hatchback vehicles it can be the easiest since there is no actual trunk; only an open area for loading items. On this car, you don't even need a screwdriver to expose the lock. The cover or panel is held in place with wing bolts that are only finger tightened (see photograph 8). After the panel has been removed

you'll see the lock which is held in with two nuts (see photograph 9). The driver you need should be about a 10mm or

Ilmm socket. (Most of the cars today are using metric—even the ones you've always thought of as domestic, so be sure to have a metric socket set or nut drivers in your van.) Now disconnect the linkage and unplug the electrical connection. The connection is standard and only requires depressing a keeper and separating the plug (see photograph 10).

Look at how sweet it is (see photograph 11). To save a milligram of weight

they provided us a window large enough to expose and give us a clear view of all the wafers. With this advantage all you have to do is cut a position to a number one depth and eyeball it. If it's still not aligning correctly, go to the next depth and repeat yourself until it aligns.

Remember to refer to the X and Y code series for reference. The codes you are using will determine the amount of help they will provide. Most will provide the spacing and depth that you'll need even though you are not working with a code number. Also remember these are true double-sided locks, so they must be cut on both sides to operate the lock.

All in all, this car turned out to be a problem child when it came to opening, but it makes up for the trouble when it comes to originating the first key.



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The Great Double Cylinder Debate

"Everyone has a different opinion on the question of installing double cylinder deadbolts. Some locksmiths like them, some don't. Here are the readers' opinions."

In my October Commentary, I asked you how you deal with the possible dangers of double cylinder deadbolts. If the door is locked, a tragedy could result in case of fire. Many readers responded with their own comments. Some of them are printed here for you.

Be aware that in some places, the building code actually prohibits the installation of double cylinder dead-bolts. Our office is located in Streamwood, IL. The building code here permits a double cylinder deadbolt to be installed on a residence. However, it prohibits installation on a commercial/business location. It pays to always

be aware of the building codes where you are operating.

Marc Goldberg

I have deadbolts on all my doors at home. For safety, I use a large headed key like the ones hotels use, and keep this key on the inside in the lock at all times. We only take the key out if we are going to leave the house, and then we hide it. When we return, we put the key back in. It works great,

When I sell a customer a double cylinder deadbolt, I give him one large headed key for each deadbolt, tell him what to do with it, and give him all the safety tips. The large head of the key also makes it easier for the older folks to use.

Since most forced entries occur when the occupants are gone, some people leave the inside key partially inserted in the lock while they are home. Abloy advertises a double cylinder deadbolt with the exit features of a thumbturn. I believe Kwikset has a double cylinder deadbolt that traps the inside key in the locked position. These locks could pos-

























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sibly be approved by building codes that prohibit other double cylinder deadbolts.

I think the original purpose of a double cylinder deadbolt was so that a burglar could not carry out your furniture. Then doors with glass in them became more popular, and the sales pitch was, use double cylinder deadbolts so the burglar could not break the glass and reach in and unlock the door. Question: Was this the only window in the house?

The original purpose was a good idea. But what about the safety of the customer? If there was a fire and the only way out was locked and there was no key left in the lock, or if the key was hanging next to the door but the customer was in a panic and could not put the key in the lock to open the door to safety, would you want to be the person that installed the double cylinder deadbolt?

If a customer insists on a double cylinder deadbolt I try to explain the safety factor and advise them to use a double cylinder deadbolt that has key retaining. If you check your catalogs, you'll find that Medeco puts out a double cylinder deadbolt that is key retaining when locked from the inside.

Robert E. Wyman II New Hampshire

When there is glass in or around the door and when it can be used for safety, I try to use a double cylinder lock. In the business place if during working hours a doors must be locked with people inside, the key can be left in the lock to operate it as a thumbturn for safety in the event of an emergency. In the home I do not recommend it.

There are other ways to make a home more secure. The best way in my opinion is an alarm system, even though I don't sell alarms or install them. I also suggest the replacement of the temptation of the glass with something more substantial. There is a certain reality we must face as locksmiths. If a burglar wants to get into a house he'll do it. The best we can do is slow him down thus making the house unattractive to him. Maybe he'll try someplace else.

About fire in the home; it can happen

at anytime. If a person is at home during a fire, there are a few things many people are not aware of. Here are some I know: 1) Smoke inhalation can kill you before the fire gets to you. 2) Smoke is thick and blinding; it's easy to get lost in your own home. 3) It's cooler and easier to breath near the floor. (The difference in temperature is amazing.) Let me give you this example. It is not an exaggerated example—if anything it's kinder than reality.

John Doe is washing dishes. The smoke alarm goes off. He knows all the safety rules about fires. Does he follow them? Probably not. He'll first go looking to see what set off the alarm. OK, he finds a fire and a lot of smoke. It fills the house. It surrounds him to the point where he cannot see at all. Some panic may set in but he's still in control. He crawls on the floor trying to remember how to get to the door. OK he finds the door and tries to open it. Oh no...double cylinder deabolt. If he was smart he has a key hidden near the door. If he was smarter he hid it near the floor. Now he found the key but he still can't see. He's going to have to work the lock by touch alone. The next time you hear from him he'll want



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thumbturns installed.

So now we arrive at the point of what do you tell a customer who wants you to install a double cylinder on the door, First of all you must remember that you have got to keep yourself clear of liability to the public and their property. Give them an education. Don't just tell your opinions give them a demonstration. Use the front door and the locks that they are already familiar with. Take the front door key and place it alone on the floor in front of the door. Tell the customer to close their eves and hold their breath then open the door. After they do it (if they can do it), inform them that in a fire they may panic or at the very least not be as relaxed and confident as they are now. Giving them a time limit of 30 to 45 seconds will also add pressure to the test but not nearly as much as a real fire.

If the customer still insists on the double cylinder then you have an option. You can install it and state on the bill that under protest you did the work after discussing the pros and cons of the lock installed or you can do what I would do—don't do the job or, recommend anyone else to do the job. Restate your opinions. My philosophy on

locksmithing is "Don't do a job you won't feel comfortable with." If the customer asks "What kind of locksmith are you?" then tell them proudly "I am a locksmith that cares about his customers." They may resort to buying the lock themselves and putting it on, but at least you are not at fault.

Several people that kept keys near the front door as you do, are now dead! I have read accounts of this in several newspapers. The keys ended up under burning pieces of the house and smoke and fumes from carpet, plastic and upholstry may incapacitate you.

I don't know what the answer is, but depending on a key you may not find is not the answer. A woman and her two children died this way not long ago. A fireman friend says if his smoke alarm goes off, he will go through the nearest wall with an axe, that he keeps in the bedroom.

First of all I explain to the customer that it is always possible for a thief to get into the house through a window and therefore it is important to have a double lock deadbolt to make it difficult to open the door and carry out large items. This is the point to explain, that the Arrow deadbolt has it's retaining bolts covered and needs to be partially opened with a key. Unlike other deadbolts they may purchase in a store. I am partial to Arrow. Arrow deadbolts are compatable with most knobsets found in houses in this area using a Kwikset key, thus they will be able to use one key for all locks.

Next comes the explanation that they need to leave a key in the lock if used at night due to a quicker fire exit. I always inform them to be sure all keys are pulled when leaving the house and locking the bolts. At this point they also need to know that no matter how good the lock, most doors can be kicked in or chopped through.

I use a special set of depth keys with a wide base to make the other locks compatible in spacing. I watch the difference between adjacent cuts to make sure the pin will have a surface to sit on.

In a last statement, I would like to say I feel it is important for a key to be left in the lock in case of fire at night. I think we would be too excited to be able to insert a key in case of a fire.

Repairing Exploded Mortise Locks

"Why is it that exploded locks are always coming into the shop in brown paper bags. Usually the customer says that the lock just exploded by itself!"

We've all seen "exploded lock views in books, technical articles, and factory parts manuals. When I first got into this trade I thought they were just instructive tools. Little did I then suspect how many exploded locks there are in the real world. Rarely a month goes by without at least one crossing my service bench.

Scientists are still trying to determine the role that brown paper bags play in this phenomenon. Certainly they seem to be somehow linked to the event, because they are always present afterward, but whether they also play a causative role is not clear. Does the mere presence of a brown paper bag cause locksets to explode, springs to unwind, screws to remove themselves and retaining clips to fly about the room? Thanks to the efforts of scientists around the world perhaps one day we will know the answer for certain.

Once a cause has been determined, perhaps it will be possible to take preventative measures to protect unwary homeowners from the fears and frustrations felt when their trusted lock suddenly disassembles itself as they helplessly watch.

But for today, our role is limited to a corrective one. This particular article will concentrate on reconstructive techniques for the generic mortise lock.

The techniques and procedures that will be discussed and shown here can be applied not only to truly exploded locksets, but also a a related event—the deliberate challenge. In truly exploded locksets the customer will usually stammer out something like "I don't understand it...It just fell apart!" But in the deliberate challenge, you are far more likely to hear "Let's see you put that together!"

The first step in reassembling the lock is to pull yourself together and organize your thoughts. Review and carefully inspect the mechanical principles and lockset functions that you should have stored either in your head or in your files. Illustration one shows some common principles worth remembering.


Observe the lock case and its scalp plate for identifiable brand names or series or part numbers that can be used to relate to information you may have on file. But in case it cannot be identified, or you are not close to your files, don't despair. The mechanical principles shown in illustration one, coupled with a little organized logical thought, can help guide you to quick success.

Start logically by laying out the parts in front of you so that all are visible. If parts obviously belong together, lay them out together. Sort springs into a separate area in front of you.

Springs are perhaps the single most important parts of the mortise lock, because they usually determine how other pieces of the lock are able to function. Illustration two shows some common types of springs. Remember, that in addition to its basic job of resisting motion by pushing or pulling "back" against the motion, springs can also act as a detent to hold an object in place. This is also shown in illustration two.

Remember that whether you have a mortise lock with six parts in it or one with 128 parts, what it does and how it does it tends to be very simple and conforms to simple guidelines.

The first thing that nearly all will have in common is a latch. It may be a springlatch, a deadlatch, or an antifriction latch, but it is likely to be there. Since the scalp plate will usually only have one or two rectangular openings of sufficient size for the latch to extend through, it is simple to figure where it



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









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
belongs, making it a good starting place for the reassembly process.

We will often have to remove parts later in the reassembly to make room for other parts that slide beneath it, but this is acceptable. The latch is one of the parts more frequently needing to be moved for this. We may also need to change the hand later, which may require the latch to be removed and re-installed.

Seat the latch gently close to its proper position and observe it. If it has a compression spring on its shaft, this will usually have to be fully compressed prior to full seating of the latch. (See illustration 3.)



The next most easily identified and placed piece is the hub. The hub may consist of one, two, or three parts (the third being a spacer ring between the other hub parts). Locate these parts. On the lock case will be a medium sized hole near the bottom. It is here that the hub will sit. The wings on the hub are










































designed to push the latch back when the hub is rotated, or to push an extender to do so. The rotation in an actual installation is accomplished by turning a knob or pushing down on a lever handle.

Seat the hub in place. If it can directly push the latch back, seat it so that it does, even if it means lifting the latch slightly to position the wings in place. Often all that will be necessary is to push the latch in.

If the hub wings cannot reach the latch, then something will be used to extend them, and transfer the action to them. The hub wings will act against this extender to create the desired reaction. As a clue to the identity of the extenders, observe the holes or posts in the area of the lock case near the hub. and between the hub and the latch. Since some form of mechanical action will be used to extend it, a pivotal point for that action will exist, and usually be identifiable. By its placement and size, it can give clues as to the type and shape of the extender, although occasionally one can still be surprised, particularly by the use of scissors extenders.

Next, let's place the stop assembly. If we have a one piece hub, this is simple. Either there is none, or if it exists it is non-functional (although still necessary for proper operation of their parts in many cases).

One notable exception to this is on older "pitcher handle" store door locksets and entrance handlesets. The thumbpiece on the outside of these handlesets acts as a direct pivot to "kick" upward on a shoe in the lock case, which then in turn retracts the latch. On these, the stop button may operate directly on the shoe, while the hub remains free to turn with a knob from the room side of the door.

Assuming that we have a two or three piece hub, the stop assembly will usually operate on the principle of a simple pivot, where one end of the pivot either directly blocks the hub from turning or uses a simple extender to do so. The most common stop assembly is shown at the bottom of illustration two, complete with its detent spring.

Now is the time to place the deadbolt assembly together and in place. The remaining large rectangular opening in the scalp plate will show us where it must be located.

There are many types of deadbolt assemblies, most of which operate on

the principle of the displaced pivot (lever stop) action. The remaining ones tend to use the worm gear principle.

Seat the deadbolt parts loosely in place and look for related parts. If the lock uses a deadbolt, usually there is some arrangement made for the thumbpiece on the room side of the door. Often this will be a simple hub arrangement, but some manufacturers use it to engage the displaced pivot (lever stop) or the worm gear action.

Once these parts are also seated loosely in place, we will either be left with mostly springs, or will have some other extenders to put into place.

Often, for example, the cam on our mortise cylinder must also be capable of withdrawing the latch. To do this, it must engage one piece near the cylinder opening, which in turn must contact other pieces to either pull or push the latch back. Here's an excellent clue as to where these parts belong. Observe the holes or posts in the parts remaining and compare them with the posts or holes in the lock case or other parts already in the lock. Usually this is only a matter of a few seconds of observation, although we may have to move some of the other parts in order to



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Opening The Sisco Protector

"In both my units the solenoid had frozen in position and no amount of electricity would open them. I even tried changing the batteries several times."

The Sisco "Protector" has become a very popular mail order type safe. It has been offered by American Express and many other companies as a premium type protector of valuables and papers. I have serviced two of these units and both problems were the same. When the correct combination was entered, the safe would beep, and

nothing else would happen. The fire safe would not open.

At first, I thought that the customers had tried to change the combination themselves, and had messed up. Not true. There is some thought that the key pad has malfunctioned, but in both my units, the solenoid had "frozen" in position, and no amount of electricity would activate it.

The proper way to operate the unit (see illustration I) is to insert the key in the cylinder, and then press the "#" key and the factory pre-set combination which is 1-2-3-4. The unit should beep and then the key will turn. The function of the keypad is to activate the internal solenoid bolt and move it out of the

way of the active bolt bar mechanism so the key can retract the single locking bolt. Simple if it works.

The problem with these is to be able to open them easily and hide your repair. In both cases, the customers who were past their 60's wanted the unit to work only by key. I told them that I could not fix the keypad or the solenoid without ordering new parts, and that would be costly as well as very time consuming. They both opted for the removal of the solenoid so the unit would be only key locking.

The procedure that I used on my first unit was to call the factory on their toll free number which is provided on the instruction sheet. I had ascertained



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













Front view of Sisco Protector fire safe door. Keypad and key must be used to open door. Japanese or Korean keyway on cam lock.

that the original combination did not work, and I wanted to know the bypass or master combinations that all these electronic safes do have. After some encouragement a very helpful lady gave me the eight bypass combinations and the procedure for working them, but, none of them, nor the original worked.

I changed batteries a couple of times, but this did not work either. The battery compartment is located on the outside of the safe just below the keypad and key lock. It requires four AA alkaline batteries before the unit will work. There is also a red diode next to the keypad that lets you know when the safe can be opened. It will glow if the solenoid is activated. It never lit, no matter what combination I tried. Was it the solenoid or the key pad that was defective? In the end, it made no difference because the safe would not open electronically.

I found an easy way to service this unit. This method will at least get it open when all else fails, and completely hide the repair when done. First, take a screwdriver and pry up the edge of the escutcheon to the right of the keypad. It is only held down by a small sheet metal clip attached to the door of the safe. The escutcheon will raise up enough to come off the clip and the whole front can be rotated ¼ turn right. (See illustration 2.)

The escutcheon will rotate because there is enough wire in the wire access hole to allow you to do this. The cam lock will stay in place, and this is what the escutcheon plate rotates on. Now all you have to do is to drill a 1/4" hole where "X" marks the spot. This location is determined by the top of the plate. Drill this hole so that it will be covered when the escutcheon is put back in place. Once the hole is drilled and angled correctly, push the solenoid down with an ice pick, turn the key, and the safe will open. Illustration three shows the inside of the safe with the solenoid in position and the safe is locked.

To repair this unit, I removed the solenoid and gave it to the customer. I then removed the blocking plate and the lock bolt. Under this plate was the large nut for the cam lock. I removed the nut and the cam lock, and then the escutcheon from the front.

The wires unplug from the back of the DIP switches. I straightened out the plate on the door of the safe, and the matching clip on the back of the escutcheon. Next, I slid the now repaired



















escutcheon left to lock on the door, and re-installed the cam lock to hold the escutcheon in place. I then put the rest of the safe back together, and I had a key only locking unit.

Since this safe was a key and keypad


type safe before, and not a key and/or keypad safe, the customer was happy to only have a key to use to open this unit. The total weight of the safe is about 70 pounds. I told the customer to write and complain to the safe manufacturer and American Express, and see if the company would help them out. I stated that I would put in the new parts for free if the factory would supply them to the customer. I do not like being a middleman in these situations. Open and prosper.



Tubar locks/Fireking files.

I recently had occasion to find a key for a Fireking high security fire file, which uses the Tubar lock. This lock, shown in photograph one, is unique to say the least. It is a pick resistant eight pin lock made by the Chicago Lock Company. The blanks are controlled, so you can forget trying to make a key to the lock, but it is a simple matter to order a key from the cabinet manufacturer.

When a new cabinet is delivered, the owner fills out a warranty registration card to register his name and the serial number of the cabinet with the manufacturer. There is no code on the lock cylinder, but the manufacturer maintains records to cross the serial number of the cabinet to the lock code. The original registered owner of the cabinet can obtain keys without charge, except for the overnight freight cost, by calling 1-800-457-2424. This is a




1. The Tuber Lock for the Fireking file.

fantastic service to the original owner, but what about the second or third owner of the cabinet?

If you are not a registered user of the file, you must send a check from your company for \$30 and a letter with your file's serial number, requesting a new key on your company's letterhead to: Fireking International, Inc., Attention: Security Access, 900 Park Place, New Albany, Indiana 47150. Upon receipt of the letter and check, Fireking will issue replacement keys. The document trail of the letter and check is designed to prevent persons within the company from obtaining "extra" or "unauthorized" keys.

Ford 10 wafer door pawls.

A new product discovery this month has made replacing broken cams on the Ford 10 wafer door locks less expensive. "Fumbles," the friendly cop, that opens cars downtown and at the shopping center, sends us a steady stream of Slim Jim victims. Some are of the Ford 10 wafer variety. If the plastic lock pawl shown in photograph two, is broken off the door cylinder, the only source for these tailpieces has been through the purchase of a complete set

of locks. That makes the cams cost roughly \$15 each.

Auto Security Products has introduced three new replacement cams for these locks that should be included in your shop inventory. A plastic tailpiece for the '84 ½ and up American Ford door lock: right side only P-42-301, left side only P-42-302, right or left side P-42-303. The cost per unit is considerably less than \$15, but you can charge what you like. Send your customers back to "Fumbles." His liability insurance should reimburse the customer for the damages. If it doesn't, he should turn in his Slim Jim.

Diplomat safe keys.

I have an address for those of you that have had a hard time finding key blanks for those Korean safes that seem to be so common lately. The "Diplomat" line of imported safes use a combination lock in conjunction with a key lock, to secure the door bolts. This feature allows the safe to be "key locked" during the day, to eliminate the necessity of working the combination each time the safe is opened, and locked with the dial at night, for higher security.

It is a nice safe, but where do you get blanks for these locks? To my knowledge, the best source for Diplomat keys is: Wilson Safe Company, 3031 Island Avenue, Philadelphia, PA 19153. Their phone number is 1-800-345-8053. The code series for these four pin locks is 1000-9029. I have no code book reference, but cut keys can be ordered by code.

The locksmith may find the "Diplomat" safes under a number of private

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labels, but they can be easily identified by the bright yellow and red triangle shaped label on the upper left hand corner of the door. The label tells the customer that the National Swedish Institute has tested and certifies the fire rating of the container. It also admonishes the customer to "enjoy security." Nice thought.

If you need replacement lock parts, handles, fascia parts or touch-up paint, Wilson can supply most of your needs from stock. Photograph three shows the head style and appearance of the Diplomat keys. The key on the left fits inner locking compartments and the key on the right fits the outside lock cylinders.




3. The Diplomat key.

Heads up, on the new Toyota ignition lock cylinder, in case you haven't already run into one. (Using the Toyota X-174 key.) The retaining pin for the ignition lock is no longer directly above the word "lock" on the face cap. The spring-loaded cylinder retaining pin is on the bottom side of the ignition lock, 2" from the front face of the lock.

To depress the retaining pin and remove the lock from the ignition housing, the plug must be turned to the "acc" position. Removal of the ignition will reveal that the code number is not found on the ignition lock. The code for these locks is found on the passenger door lock cylinder. If you need to recombinate the ignition, you will need to purchase a new lock. The face cap is riveted in place, in such a way as to make removal all but impossible. The smart money is on the new lock.

The C-30-118 (Auto Security Products) ignition lock (see photograph 4) will come combinated, with the face cap not riveted in place. It's sort of a service package, combinated with two keys but changeable to suite your need. The new Auto Security Products A-30-

106 keying kit is required. Sorry, the face caps are not available separately.

Isuzu Amigo & TF Pickup Codes

The key sections and codes for the Isuzu Amigo and TF pick-up trucks is dependant on the country of origin. If the truck was manufactured in Japan, the first characters of the VIN # will be JAA. Japanese vehicles will use Nseries codes (N5001-700). If the vehicle was manufactured in the United States, the first characters of the VIN # will be 4S1. American vehicles will use Dseries codes (D4001-6000). Changing the code series within a model and within a model year isn't that bad, but the code series will use entirely different key sections and depth/space dimensions. American vehicles will use Curtis B-74 keys, cut to the best of my knowledge, over the same depth and space as the Geo tracker (1200 CM code card XF-89). Japanese vehicles will use Curtis B-65 (Ilco# MIT1, Taylor # X176, Silca MIT8) keys, which are cut using 1200CM code card XF-88.

code series for this blank will be X1001-2000.

Jaguar XJ-6 and XJS

The 1990 Jaguar will use a new 8 cut Tibbe lock on all locks (Silca's TBE 1P blank.) The XJS will use the same Tibbe lock on the ignition, but keep the FC-7 (Curtis) or F010/F010P (Silca) key for the doors, glove and trunk locks.

1990 Honda Integra and Accord

The 1990 Integra and Accord will use the same codes as the 1988-90 Honda Civic. The X-182 (or Silca HON 45R or HON 45RP) keys will work on both cars. A new key blank, or rather a new head style, is in the works for the 1990 Accord. It should be available early in the year.

Curtis Code Book Revisions for 1990

The Chrysler code book has been updated to include all Chrysler, Plymouth, Dodge, Eagle, Renault, AMC and Jeep codes in one volume. There is also some valuable conversion information that will allow you to convert incorrect lock codes that may appear on Chrysler invoices.

All 1990 Chrysler, Plymouth and Dodge cars use the "G" codes with the double-sided Y154 (Curtis) keys. Only the vans remain on the single-sided pin

1990 Hyundi Excel

The 1990 Hyundi Excel will use a new key blank. It will be Curtis# HY-4 (Ilco HY-5, Taylor X196). The new tumbler locks. Chrysler invoices will indicate a "G" code for the vans, but the EP & ES codes are correct.

The Toyota 8-cut code book has been updated to include the new "P0001-2000" codes that are used on the 1990 Celica. The 1990 Supra will

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Installing An Electric Lock

Not too many years ago, electronic access control consisted chiefly of an electric strike and a doorbell or two. Now there are so many choices. Most customer's requirements can be satisfied with the right combination of components and a little creativity.

Two days ago I installed an Alarm Lock model 103 in a new sheriff's substation (see photograph I), but the city requested a remote control to operate it from anywhere in the building, and above all, the system had to be simple to operate. If you would have shied away from an installation like this, let me show you how it can be done.




 Sherriff's substation where Alarm Lock 103 was recently installed.

The Alarm Lock 103 electric deadbolt is a fail safe device, that is, it requires power to be locked. (There is a fail secure model which requires power to unlock, similar to most electric strikes, but I avoid using it due to the liability problems that can be associated with someone being trapped. This entrapment could happen when any of the system components malfunction.)


With this I used a radio remote control, identical to the type used on automatic gates and some garage door openers. A little control circuitry to connect the two completed the project, which was made of products available at most electronics supply houses.

Installing the lock and wiring was of a more or less standard nature. The door opened in both directions, and this required a little extra care when installing both the 103 and the door cord. The door cord could not be installed on the side frame piece as usual, but had to be moved somewhat to avoid touching the jamb when swinging in. I wanted to insure a large enough safety factor, to prevent damage if the door sags, or is otherwise out of alignment. (See photograph 2.)

The 103 operates (locks) whenever two conditions are met. First, there must be 24 volts AC or DC applied, and second, the magnet must be near the reed relay (inside the lock unit). (See photograph 3.)



Two conditions for operation are met here.

The magnet is hidden inside the strike in most applications. The reason for the magnet is to only allow the bolt to turn when the door is closed, because the bolt is being projected with the door open would "lock" the door open. Requiring such a concious effort by an employee to lock the door each time would detract from the security otherwise provided.

The bolt will extend approximately %", which is slightly deeper than the strike. Therefore, adequate space must be allowed between the lock and strike to permit for full extension of the bolt. If the bolt is not fully extended the current used by the bolt will increase and overheat the deadbolt.

Hiding the wiring can make the installation appear more professional, and a hollow door and jamb can make this easier. I would like to take this opportunity to come out of the closet. I have been known to use a coat hanger in time of need. You can often coax a wire along inside a hollow space (see photograph 4), but getting the end to poke out a 7/16" opening is another matter entirely.

A stiff piece of wire such as a coat hanger with the end bent into a hook is handy for fishing objects such as this

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out of walls and other hollow spaces. (See photograph 5.) When using an armored door cord such as the Alarm Lock type, let it hang by one end and push the wire down through it. (See photograph 6.) It is very difficult to push a wire through one of these in a U-shape.




5. Coat hanger used to fish in the door.



Proper method for feeding the armored door cord into the door.


A bare spot on the wall above the false ceiling was chosen to house the receiver and control circuitry (see photograph 7). Since conduit was not required above the ceiling, wire was placed with a Craftsman wire projection device; in this case a %" wrench with the wire tied to it and thrown across the room.

At the rear of the room, wiring is concealed from the ceiling down to the outlet by Wiremold brand surface style conduit. After the stud centers were found, clips were attached and the conduit snapped in place. We used a plug in style power supply, which in this case was rated at over one amp

more than was needed for the lock. After connection, excess wire was pulled into the ceiling leaving only enough for the power supply to rest on the floor if unplugged (see photograph 8).

The control box was wired last. (See photograph 9.) On the left is the digital




9. The alarm's control box.

receiver for the remote controls, and on the right is a double pole double throw (DPDT) relay with mounting socket. The wire sticking out of the receiver is the antenna. This is connected according to the wiring diagram (see illustration 10).


The relay, which can be thought of as a remote controlled switch, uses voltage applied to the coil in order to be activated. In our circuit, the lock is directly connected to one side of the power supply. The other side of the power needed for operation flows from the other connection on the power supply, into the common contact of the relay, out the normally closed (NC) contact, and to the lock. The common and NC are electronically connected whenever there is no voltage on the coil. But if you apply the necessary voltage to the coil, the common will disconnect from the NC, and the common will be connected to the NO. This situation will remain until voltage is removed from the coil.

In our circuit this means that as long as the relay is relaxed, power can flow to the lock. During any time the receiver is receiving the proper signal, however, it will supply the relay coil with voltage thus interrupting the flow to the lock. The logic used in setting up this system is that we need power to flow to the lock constantly when the system is plugged in. We want that power to be interrupted (unlocking the door) only while an employee is pushing the button on a remote control.

We have made yet another important discovery for those who work with new construction. We now know what happens to the second set of keys the builder never gives to the tenant (see photograph 11).



The power supply we used is 24 volts AC as this is the only correct power for this type of digital receiver (generally used in the access control systems we deal with most). In AC because there is no fixed + and - designation for the wires, there is no need to worry about whether or not you are connecting them backwards on the power supply or load (lock, strike, etc.). The only consideration is that the load needs to be connected to both output connections of the power supply in order to activate.



Helpful Questions and Answers

Q: I am fairly new to the trade, having recently completed a course in locksmithing, so my knowledge is greater than my practical experience. Also, I have started to work as a locksmith. Sometimes I feel like I'm walking through a mine-field where one mis-step and...

Here is the reason for this letter. Recently another local locksmith asked me to masterkey a number of locks for a department of a company. The company already has a massive masterkey system in place. I was told they wanted the new locks set up on the exiting grand master and the master key for that department.

I asked him if he could provide a chart of the entire system so that I could avoid making a key that might fit another lock for which it was not intended. He told me I shouldn't worry about that because there were so many

locks in the system that it would be improbable. He said just do the job. I turned the job down because of this.

The question is was I right and who would have the chart? If no chart is available then what's the proper procedure?

Name Witheld Upon Request

A: You seem almost apologetic for being a newcomer to locksmithing, and yet you turned down a profitable job out of a sense of ethics. I wish all "newcomers" showed as much promise ...and even more that the "oldtimers" all did, too

You faced a common problem. The expansion of an existing system without proper records can be a real bear of a job if you care about the system's integrity. The locksmith who advised you not to worry because "there are so many locks in the system that key interchange would be improbable" was wrong. No ifs, ands, buts or excuses can alter that statement.

If the system were a "Simple Masterkey System" such as one I designed for HUD with 4000 locks under only one level of master and only two of those keys issued, perhaps some of his optimism could be excused, although he still would not be showing the best judgement possible. But in this case we have a departmental master involved as well. Regardless of the method employed in writing the original system, all of the keys under that departmental master will have something in common with it. This will limit the possibilities for cuts of keys beneath it, increasing the likelihood that any key you create to fit beneath that master will already be in use.

Additionally, that key will fit into the physical territory set aside in the building for that department. This means that the key is likely, if its mate already exists, not to just fit a key somewhere in the great expanse of the building, but to instead fit another lock located nearby. This further increases the likelihood that it not only will be capable of operating another lock, but that this will be discovered...possibly with dire consequences for the security of the building.

What are the alternatives that would allow you to satisfy the customer's needs and still maintain a reasonable degree of security for the building? One is to locate the actual system. Is it possible that this does not exist anywhere? Yes. But is it also possible that it does exist? Yes, again, although that may or may not do you any good.

Someone somewhere designed the original system. This may be the local



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architectural hardware consultant, a factory keying department, a builder's hardware distributor, or a local locksmith.

If they showed any responsibility, they will have maintained a key bitting list to which the company involved is entitled. Possibly they might make it available for a nominal fee.

Bear in mind that this is not the masterkey system bitting layout showing all combinations possible, including those allotted for future expansion. Generally speaking these are the property of the person that developed the system, not the end user or his representatives, including yourself.

If you get the key bitting chart of combinations actually in use, you can determine the information needed to re-create the system, mark off the combinations already in use, and have a completed usable document for future use. This is a lot of work, but your customer should be willing to pay for it if he realizes what he is actually getting for his money, and that as long as he uses your services it is a one-time expense.

If he is not willing, then perhaps he agrees with your friendly local lock-smith who saw it as "no problem." Be aware that no one, even in writing, can absolve you of responsibility to do the job in a workmanlike, professional manner, conforming to applicable codes, to ensure the public safety.

What this means is that even if he notarizes a form accepting responsibility for any interchanges that occur, you may still be held liable for certain types of consequences that might occur as a result of it. Is it likely? No. Locksmiths have been remarkably lucky in legal matters over the years, and are likely to continue to be so for quite some time.

If you would still rather do the job right, perhaps you can absorb the time and expense to purchase the key bitting chart through the company involved, re-create the system, and re-coup your expenses over a period of time, if you see the company's relationship to you as financially important.

Or you can start from scratch to decode the system by determining the relationships, first among the levels of masterkeys involved, and then from the relationships that exist between the masters and their subordinate change keys. This is a long and drawn out process, but can be done with a full knowledge of masterkeying techniques, methods and formats. Regardless of the path you follow to re-create the system, however, there is a real Joker in the deck, waiting to foil all of your best efforts and sneer in the face of your professional approach to the problem.

Your friendly, local locksmith with "No Problem" who approached you about this job may have done other locks to be added to the system, without worrying. Or other locals may have beaten him to it. The job could already have multiple interchanges. No amount of professional efforts on your part can avoid these, although they are not your legal liability problem. They belong to the less professional locksmiths out there who don't worry about things like that.

Q: I'm writing to you to see if someone in your company might help me put a value, date, and tell me some history on the padlock in photograph one. I've taken it to some local locksmiths but they don't know a thing about it. I did get an uncut key for it. They also think the Champion Lock Company is out of business.

One old timer thinks it's a lock to a rifle box. When I found it, it was lying in an area heavily concentrated with bullets. So I think it's the lock to an ammo box.

The lock says Champion 6-Lever on the front of it, and on the shank is stamped Pat. Pend. The shank moves up and down freely but does not lock. All the levers inside also move freely.

I found it while scuba diving in Lake Ontario, off the barracks at Sacketts Harbour Historical Battelfield of the War of 1812, where a lot of military activity took place from the late 1700's through 1944.

That's all the information I can tell you. Any information you could pro-

vide me would be greatly appreciated. Thank you for your time.

A: This is known as a "lever push key" type of padlock and was manufactured by almost every lock manufacturing company in the late 1800's and early 1900's. There must have been millions of them made.

Champion was a trade name for the Miller Lock Co. from 1870 until 1880. The first patent for this type of lock that we have found was issued to D.K. Miller July 26, 1870. It will be found with names other than Champion on the case and it is often difficult to pin down an actual manufacturing date although we do have some clues to work on.

The Miller Lock Co. catalog of 1885 states that Phosphor Bronze Springs are used which are "Guaranteed not to rust or give out under the influence of any climate." Since there is apparently no spring action in your lock we would have to assume that the springs were made of steel and just rusted away from being submerged for so long. If this assumption is true then the piece would have been manufactured prior to 1895. Many design changes were made through the years and of course each change could have been registered with another patent.

Your piece states "Patent Pending" which means that it could have been manufactured for years prior to the actual patent being issued. We find patent #695,347 issued on March 11, 1902 to Frank Soley and assigned to the Miller Lock Co. for an identical padlock (in external appearances) but this may have been for some internal changes. And, of course, this patent could have been pending for years.

The absence of any spring action in this piece leads me to believe that it was manufactured about 1880, but, who knows, maybe they experimented with some different spring materials that just didn't hold up to the waters of Lake Ontario. The 1885 catalog shows this as Style #1 at \$12.00 per dozen with a 40% wholesale discount. An additional 2% was allowed if paid within 10 days.

If the lock shows evidence of having been nickle plated it would be style #20 at \$16.00 per dozen. Collector value today would not be much more than in the \$5.00 to \$10.00 range. Historically, the company was known as the D.K. Miller Co., The M.L. Co. and The

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Miller Lock Co. and was sold to Yale & Towne about 1930. Yale continued to manufacture a part of the line for a few years apparently discontinuing all Miller locks about 1940. I hope this information will be helpful to you and I do appreciate the opportunity to explore such an interesting find.

Q: I'm looking for the codes to truck cap door locks, K139 etc. I'm getting calls, but I can't cut the key. It's not K 101-299 Vol. Corbin., that's a Star CO7

These truck cap locks use a YJ3 Star blank. I hope you can help me out.

A: At first I assumed you were talking about a gas cap or gas cap cover, and it dawned on me that you probably were referring to a camper shell as the truck cap, so I'll approach the question with that assumption. Your Star number JT3 equals Ilco 01122 which tells me in all probablity the lock is Ilco, Yale, or Chicago because that blank readily passes those locks.

The most logical approach would be to either read the wafers or impression it. Other than that, pick and disassemble the lock. A cam lock is just a matter of removing a screw on the rear. The universal handle type requires drilling for a retainer; pick the lock and rotate a quarter turn. Measure back from the face .771/19.3 mm and drill as small of a hole as possible. This could be governed by your accuracy. Drill in line with the end of the keyway that doesn't have the wafers protruding into the keyway. Depress the retainer while pulling outward with an extractor. 02

Q: I have just bought six J&J Taylor safes aka., Toronto Safe Works. They are all in fair to good condition but all are locked. My manipulation technique is not very good; I will have to resort to drilling.

Could you please supply me with any drill points or other information that would help me open these units.

P.S. J&J Taylor used the old S&G roller bolt 3 and 4 wheel key changeable. Any help would be greatly appreciated.

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


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A: Jeff, without more information I am afraid we can't be of much help. I have photos and specs on many J.J. Taylor safes. Even some poloroids would help enormously for identification purposes. Enclosed are photos of a rather large Taylor with an old indirect-drive Sargent and Greenleaf lock on the inside. (See photographs 2, 3 and 4.) You will notice the absence of






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models, and for us to know what exactly you are up against, we at least need a photograph to identify the

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properly place them.

Earlier, this would have been difficult to do because there would have

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been so many to observe, but at this stage it is usually quite easy.

Our last assembly step is the placment of springs. The springs shown in illustration two should be an excellent guide in determining the correct spring and its related position in the lock.

Once the springs are in place, we can hand hold the cover in place and test the action of the lock. Then all that remains is to set the *hand* for the swing of the door. This is quite simple when you use the set of charts shown in illustration four.

First, determine what you already have, based on the latch position in relation to the lock cylinder (outside) of the door lock. Then observe the opening on which the lock is to be placed, and determine the "swing" of the door. Once you have done these two steps, follow the chart to go from what you already have (left side of chart) to what you need for the door (across the top of the chart). Do what it tells you, and the job is complete.

Now you are ready to collect your money or your prize. ■

Keys'n Case™ by Curtis Industries

A new "spare key" program is available from Curtis. The "Keys'n Case" consists of a Dupont Delrin II plastic key, in a flexible plastic pouch. Photograph five shows the keys in the extended and retracted positions. The
